


Setting is the time and place that a story takes place. The setting tells the reader where and when the story is happening.



Select a fiction book that interests you. As you read, pay attention to the setting. Do the words help you see the story's setting in your mind?

When analyzing setting, we can ask and answer questions such as:
When? Where? Why? How?
We can also look at how the other elements of the story are impacted by the details of the setting.
For example: How does the setting in Jack and the Beanstalk influence (or have an impact on) the characters?
When we <i>analyze</i> , it is helpful to think of questions that we are trying to answer.
Write down 3 questions that will help you to analyze the setting of the story. Answer the questions.

Writing Activity
Think of ideas for a fantasy story that you can write. (Look up fantasy if you're not sure what the word means).
What will the setting of your story be?
Who will your characters be?
Will there be a conflict?
Who will be the protagonist?
Who will be the antagonist?

Now, write your story in your journal. Once you have finished writing your story, edit, revise and rewrite your story. Share it with your friends and family members. Make sure to ask them questions about the details of your story and their thoughts about it.




Read the spelling words in the word box. Say the spelling words aloud. Write out 6 of the spelling words using glue then sprinkle glitter on top.
